

International Voluntary Service (IVS) has since 1920 sought to respond to the prevalent issues of society on a local and global level, it aims to pursue peace and promotes non-violence through international understanding, mutual respect, friendship, exchange and cooperation among the people of the world.

IVS is a vehicle for non-formal and informal education and acts as a catalyst for change within individuals and in communities giving people the chance to participate in meaningful, productive and socially useful work as active members of society. It promotes the participation of all regardless of gender, skin color, religion, nationality, age, ability, sexual orientation, social status or political views and any other possible grounds for discrimination, in a spirit of true equality and the recognition of the right of others to dignity and respect.

IVS promotes social and climate justice, human rights, sustainability, critical thinking, active participation, global citizenship, democracy, shared and intercultural learning and helps to break down prejudice and stereotypes. It contributes to the Implementation of the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals.

Workcamp is one form of voluntary service where the volunteers live and work together with the local people based on the local needs. Majority of IVS projects are organized as international workcamps gathering people from all over the world. See more info. about IVS here: What is our IVS?

Sri Lanka (GV4GF)

We went to an isolated village to meet members of the youth club. After a few minutes, whole villagers are gathered around the kindergarten. Because they thought that foreigners came to distribute food. We explain our objectives and programs to them. After that only a few people left and all the others stayed with us. It became a community activity, not only for youths. They learned the Japanese education system, foods, disciplines, how to find jobs, and origami. They are a marginalized community.

The Philippines (GIED)

Japan-Philippines Bilateral Workcamp, 18-26 February 2023: Barangay Pang-pang, Barili, Cebu, Philippines is one of the mountain barangays of the town of Barili, Cebu. The mountain village provide basic social services to its local constituents. Though it is in the remote village, it hosts a sustainable agriculture techno-demo farm with integrated organic vegetable production development project in partnership with the Municipal Agriculture Office of the Local Government of Barili. 9 Japanese participated the Eco-Cultural camp in Pang-pang Village that yielded a beautiful and positive memories both from the Japanese participants and the local village specialy their children and youth. 9 days of intensive inter-cultural learning through games, sports, music, cooking, crafts and performances were experienced. The opportunity to understand the effect of climate change in the typhoon prone Philippines through exposure to their agricultural farms were also undertaken as well as a visit in the public elementary schools to introduce Japan culture to the students were presented as their contribution to enhance a lively interaction of two cultures in selected classrooms. With a handful of natural attractions within the Barili town, such as waterfalls, caves, cold springs, mountains and beaches, the participants had a chance to enjoy some of these natural outdoor adventures to simply relax and have fun. The camp may be short but the effect it brought to the participants and the village is priceless as they built friendship, created memories together and contributed solidarity and peace with each other.

The Philippines (GIED)

IVD Christmas Bootcamp, 12-15 December 2023: In honor of our volunteers worldwide this International Volunteer Day 2023, Global Initiative for Exchange and Development Inc. - GIED in partnership with the Local Government of Alegria, Cebu organized our 2nd IVD Christmas BOOTCAMP with our long term foreign volunteers last 12-15 December in Alegria, Cebu, Philippines In the mountain village of Compostela, Alegria our volunteers did a river clean-up in one of the jump-off canyonnering sites, planted bamboo trees in the nearby BADAM Water Shed protected area and sorted out garbage in their MRF facility. Afterwhich we had an overnight fellowship in the beach to commemorate our ecological efforts and build camarederie among our long term volunteers and local partner institution. The Bootcam was our way gifting back what our NATURE truly deserves through our small acts of service to breathe, cleanse, heal and rejuvenate even in a brief time together.

Macao (MNCYA)

WHV - The Feast of Na-Tcha in the Historic Centre of Macau (13/06/2022 – 24/06/2022): The volunteers designed World Heritage promotional materials and run seminars. roadshows and site tours to promote and improve understanding and enhance actions for heritage preservation in the society, participating actively in the activities of the Feast of Na-Tcha to reach out young people, tourists, local stakeholders and concerned authorities.





Macao (MNCYA)

MNCYA workcamp (13th year) - (12.1-12.3): During the 13th year of the MNCYA Workcamp, held from December 1st to 3rd, an unforgettable episode took place that left a lasting impact on one of the volunteers. This particular workcamp aimed to bring together volunteers from different countries to work on community development projects and foster cultural exchange. Volunteers from China even brought a bottle for national participants to wrote down memorable experiences.

India (RUCHI)

Tibetan Culture combined with Waste Upcycling workcamp from 11/09 to 23/09/2023: 14 international volunteers joined the project and educated the local communities on waste upcycling; two types of items were preferred - discarded tires and all kinds of plastic. They were trained on how to make interlocking tiles from plastic waste and use discarded tires for garden furniture besides other items of use, like weight lifting tool. Community was thrilled to join and learn of these new techniques. The idea was to develop their skills to start small innovative enterprises in local area. The same work was repeated in Dharamshala area where they joined another organization in a clean campaign and learned of Tibetan culture and history.





India (RUCHI)

Tibetan Culture and Waste Upcycling from 11/09 to 23/09: Pille-Riin, a middle age woman, was one of the 14 volunteers who joined this project. She was from Estonia and this was her first volunteering opportunity. She was confused in the beginning about the type of work and physical work involved in it. However, her perspective changed after 4-5 days and she was not only fully involved but stated enjoying everything. She learned a lot about upcycling, enjoyed interacting with women and contributed on farm activities. She intends to come back but meanwhile she continues to donate small funds to RUCHI.

India (FSL)

Completion of sanitation camp by ESTP University students as volunteers from France send by JR France. The camp started since 2012 and the volunteers have created awareness on sanitation to the tribal community, the school students with mural paintings and renovation work and construction of 45 toilets. The community also raised the resources from the Government and completed the toilet construction for all the families.





India (FSL)

Taiwan (VYA)

Project: Discover the Rich Folk Culture of Xiushan Community Date: Aug.9th-22nd: Since 2017, the Xiushan Project has famous in work together with elders and share religious traditions by local masters. International volunteers' participation just like alternative vitamin to re-booth into elders. Make them become energetic and younger. Project: Centennial Spring's Beauty Revives Date: Jul. 5th-10th: First time for local partner to host international volunteers. A town has spring within it for century long, and the residents use the spring for washing dishes and clothes, for tea making after boiled, etc... Volunteers came to learn the ancestors' wisdoms and also decorate the area of spring side to remind local people to co-live with the nature.



Taiwan (VYA)

Old House Renovation and Culture Exchange in Xiluo Date: Oct.-Dec. Marco is from Italy. To participate as a LMTV in Xiluo project was also first time to stay in Asia. For engaging with more local people, community partner connected the primary school to let Marco to has class on cultural exchange on every Thursday morning, in 2 different grades. In addition, teachers and administrative staff also invite Marco to join the dinner talk of parents committee and excursion during weekend. During his stay, he not only knew about the history of rural Xiluo, but also has wonderful friendship with people there.

Thailand (DaLaa)

Voluntary Service Community,- All year around- We call the place where our association is VSC. This was our dream since we started DaLaa 20 years ago to have our own community where we can spread and practice our important values. Since a few years we managed to make it happen and we are improving in managing our life with a mix of office work and community work. Recently it feels more and more in harmony and the relationships of family that we managed to maintain despites the change of people in incredible. For us this is a real advancement in the name of peace on Earth. We would like to thank all our volunteers who join VSC in 2023. This felt very meaningful.





Thailand (DaLaa)

Hug Ban Den, Lampang province, North Thailand. For 2 months in October- November 2023, Marie from Belgium has been the first volunteer to stay with our host Kru Ann in this little village from the North Thailand. As the first and only volunteer in this village, she was fully immersed in the local culture and so well taking care of. She discovered the strength of the simple life and solidarity in the village. Before joining the workcamp, she was pretending to be popular for the majority of her involved various communities without really showing her natural character. She was often afraid if she is refused/ disliked by the groups. This is quite typical for many Japanese people especially youth to mind how they are looked before they show what they really want. But through the workcamp experience to work, live, eat, play, laugh, talk together toward the common goals and values with different personalities/ cultures, she has got real friends, confidence and changed her mind/ behavior to be as she is. Her experience was presented in the IVS contest of NICE where she got the semi-championship for the volunteers' department!

Nepal (VIN)

Children Summer Camp 10th -22 July, 17- 27 July, and 23 July-3 August: VIN organized three children's summer camp in 10th July, 17th July, and 23rd July at Raktamala School and Karkala Devi School in Okhaldhunga and one summer camp at Jitpurphedi school in Kathmandu. The main objectives were to provide a unique opportunity for overall development (social, emotional, physical, mental, creativity) & provide fun time for children aged 6-12 utilizing their vacation period. To promote friendship, understanding, and solidarity among local young volunteers and cross-national volunteers. To provide an opportunity to understand and appreciate the Nepalese culture and tradition via cultural immersion. This summer camp involved a series of activities, including sports, art, music, dance, academics, and cultural events, aimed at developing children's knowledge and skills. These initiatives are designed to encourage learning activities during public holidays, providing a platform for holistic development of the children. More than 100 children participated in these three-summer camp in Okhaldhunga and Kathmandu. We will share the annual report to the partners soon. Thanks to our volunteers and other stakeholders.





Nepal (VIN)

Early Childhood Development -- From 30th October for 8 weeks: The name of the project is Early Childhood Development in Okhaldhunga which started in -30th October for 8 weeks. This project focused to the development of the young children. We conduct this project in Okhaldhunga and Jitpurphedi (Kathmandu). ECD project focuses on enhancing motor skills and social skills in children aged 3 to 6. Volunteers organize diverse activities, including recreational; like games, singing rhymes, drawing, and art and craft sessions, to promote holistic development among the participating children.

The volunteers enjoyed a lot in the project. Beside this we organized and conducted many projects in the community and Monastery where volunteers enjoyed and learned many things in their life.

I won't exaggerate when I say that I never once encountered a bad mood in their company. Everyone is so cheerful, non-confrontational, pleasant, friendly, smiling, and relaxed. As for my family, I lived in a little house with three amazing aunties: auntie Mag, auntie Sathi Devi (both aunties also known as my grandmas or girlfriends), auntie Gnanes, dog Toffie, and a female dog Šiba. Besides this home, I also worked in two larger retirement homes => amazing people with a sad ending, but still happy, nonetheless. Moreover, there were also amazing employees, who cannot be overlooked. My new sisters Radhika and Sumati or the most kind-hearted boss...and other lovely stuff... Shared walks, shopping, singing, gardening, jokes, board games, exercise, celebrations, deep conversations, tears, or when auntie Sathi Devi told me she would like to die knowing that someone would take care of me (referring to my love life) ... All of these things, whether we want it or not, build a family bond among you. Apart from the happy moments, I unfortunately also experienced a sad moment when one uncle passed away in front of my eyes. This makes the wishes from my aunties even more meaningful when they wish me a beautiful life that has actually just begun for me... Unfortunately, everything has its end, and I am proud that I will carry their legacy and memories of them and us for the rest of my life. Thank you for everything aunties, you will be always in my heart.





Myanmar (GIVE) We couldn't host any IVS project in 2023 due to the conflict in Myanmar.





Laos (HJA)

Laos (HJA)

Case study of Miss. Lao Khang, an alumnus of HJA Volunteer Internship Placement in 2012-20213. Miss. Lao Khang is a Hmong ethnic, born in the village of Nam Khon Co, Nong Hat District, Xieng Khuang Province. She was born in a middle-class family. After her father died and her mom became sick, she had to leave School and take care of her 6 brothers and sisters. In 2012-2013, Lao Khang was selected as a volunteer of HJA. her communication with her friends was quite difficult, making her not confident in talking with other people in Lao language. As the months passed, Lao Khang met many new friends and her communication skills improved. she also worked as an assistant rugby teacher. After finishing as a volunteer from HJA, she was recruited as a permanent staff member of the Lao Rugby Federation with the responsibility of being the coordinator of the development of Rugby sports in Xieng Khuang province. Her success story has been published in both domestic and foreign press. She is proud to be a part of helping young people interested in playing all kinds of sports, especially rugby. She uses now English to talk to foreigners, she traveled to many countries to attend rugby matches and exchange lessons with various countries, such as: Hong Kong, Malaysia, Singapore, England, Australia, Qatar and other countries. She is very proud that she has come to this point, she learned many skills, got a good opportunity to volunteer until she became a Lao youth leader and passed on the lessons to the next generation of volunteers.



3-2. Asian Voluntary Service

Asian Voluntary Service (AVS) is a special program of NVDA to exchange the LMTVs (Long and Mid Term Volunteers) in the workcamp (group) format. It started in 2014 and 84 volunteers from 14 countries have been hosted in 40 projects of 11 countries till 2017.

We restarted it in a new format of **exchanging Office Interns & Project Leaders** in 2023! **10 vols. from 5 countries** were working wonderfully in **7 NGOs of 6 countries in Aug. 01-Sep. 16**. with the financial support by the **Mitsubishi UFJ Foundation** in Japan.

I could rediscover myself through this project. I have learned Japanese language to communicate with the local people more actively and also could inspire other youth with reviewing my way of work.



3-3. SCC (Global Voluntary Service to Stop Climate Change)

Back to Table of Contents

To dramatically increase the impact of carbon reduction, NVDA started the SCC project in 2016 together with Member NGOs and Sister Networks financially supported by the UPS Foundation, NLAPO (National Land Afforestation Promotion Organization, Japan) and Mitsubishi UFJ Foundation.

SCC conducts **3 months workcamps** of the practical work such as planting mangrove seedlings and making bamboo charcoal to be used as fuel instead of oil with hosting **Short Term workcamps** and calling for **Carbon Offset** donors. In 2018, it reduced 161 tons of CO2 with 164 vols. in 8 countries.

In 2020-21, IVS (International Voluntary Service) projects were stopped due to COVID-19, but new donation project "Eco Tree Action" started. Short term workcamps were restarted in 2022 also at the SCC project site of Cambodia and Indonesia that were greatly developed further in 2023!

Eco Tree Action (Japan & Cambodia)

This CSR project started in 2021 by Citizen (watch company) which donates the money to plant one mangrove tree every time their customer refuses to a paper rapping box. In 2023 (2022 Nov.-2023 Oct.), CYA & NICE could generate 5,205 USD and planted 25,050 trees by this action!

Trapaing Sangke (Cambodia)

The forest has been terribly lost by the port construction and illegal cut, so the community started reforestation and the eco-tourism center. CYA started the workcamps in 2012 and organized over 10 projects in 2023. The above-mentioned Eco Tree Action is conducted in this project.

Mulyo Asri (Indonesia)

The village was severely flooded by the climate change, but the local young people have initiated to revive the area.

The bilateral workcamps by GREAT & NICE were organized in 2023 Feb. and Aug. with 20 vols. from Japan & Indonesia including a staff of the bag company which donates the money.





3-4. Members Monthly Meeting

NVDA started organizing this online meeting from 2020 Dec. that is open to the leaders and staff members of Member NGOs, focusing on organizational management, in particular to the survival strategies and innovative practices. Till 2021 Dec., it was held 5 times with 84 participants from 24 Member NGOs in 17 countries/ areas joined & 8 NGOs presented 11 practices.

It had been stopped since 2022 due to various reasons, but revived on 2023 **Dec. 20**th where **13 leaders/ staff of 12 member NGOs in 11 countries** actively discussed on various issues.







3-5. Publication & Promotion of IVS
