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1. OVERVIEW

1-1. IVS & Workcamps

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International Voluntary Service (IVS) has since 1920 sought to respond to the prevalent issues of society on a local and global level, it aims to pursue peace and promotes non violence through international understanding, mutual respect, friendship, exchange and cooperation among the people of the world.

IVS is a vehicle for non-formal and informal education and acts as a catalyst for change within individuals and in communities giving people the chance to participate in meaningful, productive and socially useful work as active members of society. It promotes the participation of all regardless of gender, skin color, religion, nationality, age, ability, sexual orientation, social status or political views and any other possible grounds for discrimination, in a spirit of true equality and the recognition of the right of others to dignity and respect.

IVS promotes social and climate justice, human rights, sustainability, critical thinking, active participation, global citizenship, democracy, shared and intercultural learning and helps to break down prejudice and stereotypes. It contributes to the Implementation of the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals.

Workcamp is one form of voluntary service where the volunteers live and work together with the local people based on the local needs. Majority of IVS projects are organized as international workcamps gathering people from all over the world. See more info. about IVS here: [What is our IVS?](#)



Most of VSTV & STV are organized as Workcamps (group type) while most of MTV & LTV are organized as the individual type.






2-1. IVS Statistics in Asia 2022

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
484 (202 IVS + 255 NVP + 27 IOP) projects were organized

* IVS projects were 18% decreased from 2021, but if National Voluntary projects (NVP) and International Online projects (IOP) are included, 484 projects (98% increased from 2021).

* 50% of total, 67% of MTV and 70% of LTV projects were Educational (possibly due to less restriction by COVID-19 for working with kids) while 41% of STV were Environmental.






* **IVS** was 27% decreased from 2021, but if **National Voluntary projects** and **International Online projects** are included, 4,959 vols. (126% increased from 2021).

Australia (IVP)

Plants for Peace: Balmoral Village 10 Dec 2022 This was the final delivery of plants under this project and used the last of the grant money. Dave and Rita picked up a borrowed truck borrowed from Steve on Friday afternoon. On Saturday at 8am we drove the 10 km to Towrang and loaded plants. Under the guidance of Andrew, who owns Danganelly nursery, this involved choosing, sorting, discarding, repacking, counting and recording, then loading onto the truck and watering. There were us 750 plants and it took about an hour and a half to do all this. Then we returned to Rita's to sort and load the approx 200 plants stored there (discarding many after learning from Andrew to be ruthless). We then drove the hour and a half to Balmoral village where we met with Wies and Kay from Quakers, who brought plants from their storage in Sydney. The plants were well received as you can see in the photos. We had a lovely day, as we usually do with these plant deliveries. We enjoyed the barbeque and chats before heading back. We re-filled the truck cleaned it and returned it to Steve. The whole trip was 240km. Wies' round trip was also 248km so both will be reimbursed from the grant.



Mongolia (MCE)

Eco farming, 10/Jul,2022. This workcamp is for helping vegetable farm of orphanage. Summer season is very hot there and kids use to have old shade. Volunteer from Netherlands who joined this workcamp in 2019 made some campaign to raise money to build new shade for kids in his country. So when we able to host workcamps after 2 years of time for Covid-19, he rejoin the workcamp and we have build 2 new shade for kids.

Mongolia (MCE)

Orphanage's & Eco farming, 23/Jul,2022. This workcamp has only 2 International volunteers. But young 19 years old girl was expecting many volunteers for the workcamp and very much disappointed for the number. Especially other member of workcamp was over 60 years old. So first few days she was very quite and sad. But after spending few days at workcamp she changed her self so much and enjoyed her stay at workcamp made very good friends with kids.

The Philippines (GIED)

Japan-Philippines Bilateral Workcamp, August 2022.

The Japanese group are the first batch of participants to to our workcamp after two years of no workcamp projects due to the threat of COVID-19 Pandemic. The interaction between the two countries was very rich as they provided support to the renovation of the SPAAFI Techno Demonstration Farm that was destroyed during the typhoon Rai in December 2021 as well as visiting public elementary schools to deepen the inter-cultural learning. They brighten the vibes and built friendship with the local community with their presence and spent happy moments with them.

The Philippines (GIED)

Japan-Philippines Bilateral Workcamp, August 2022. For the first time in the history of GIED, 8 of its current University Interns joined the workcamp due to their excitement to participate face to face project for the first time after two years of very restricted mobility in the Philippines caused by the Covid-19 Pandemic. They were very motivated to organize and participate the said workcamp at the same time.

Macao (MNCYA)

WHV- The Historic Centre of Macao- Macao New Chinese Youth Association, 11 June – 19 June 2022 After a certain time of quarantine at the beginning of the year, as well as many social activities were cancelled, local volunteers seems to have more interest on our activities and are more active on face-to-face interaction. 1.The day before the Parade,volunteers participated in the opening ceremony and stamped their bodies to pray for good health 2."Feast of Na Tcha" kicked off in Chi San Na-Tcha Temple 3.Participate in the annual enent"Feast of Na Tcha" as a flag bearer, cheering with fairies, holy water pipes, qongs and drums



Macao (MNCYA)

Through a series of training programs with different themes, volunteers gathered in Macau to learn voluntary work, exchange and cooperation, share the similarities and differences of cultural inheritance and education promotion, broaden their horizons, and deepen their understanding of Macau society, intangible culture and heritage knowledge. 1).In the "World Heritage Tour at Night", the guide guides the participants to understand the relationship between the history of Macao and the evolution of local cuisine 2). The "Cultural Exchange Night" is personally planned by participants from all over the country, introducing the local culture and special snacks of their hometown. 3). During the " Gastronomy Promotion Action", many passers-by along the way participated in tasting food. Feedback was overwhelming and the atmosphere was fun. They share and promote the food and traditional culture of Macau.



Indonesia (DJ)

English Weekend Camp, 15 – 16 October 2022 It was 22 participants join this project. This activity aimed to improve the participants' language skills and encourage the local people to learn English. Not only that but also to connect the participants with the local community so that the locals can promote its social, cultural, educational, and environmental activities to the participants. With the hope that it will advance the economic and tourism potential in Duren village, Bandungan sub-district.



Indonesia (DJ)

Volunteers Companion, 22 November 2022. Dejavato held a Volunteers Companion (Volscom) in Detekon view, Semarang. The volunteers received all the materials, such as companion procedure, city tours and basic Indonesia, from the Dejavato staff. This activity aimed to involve local volunteers in international voluntary service. It is also the opportunity to introduce Indonesian culture and uniqueness to foreign volunteers.

Indonesia (GREAT)

Star Paws Cat Ranger, 1-3 September 2022: This is the first time to conduct a work camp with a fresh project topic and new local partners. It has opened the volunteering opportunity for new local and potentially international volunteers in the future. Mulyo Asri Mangrove, 3-6 September 2022: This is a reactivated project about mangroves which GREAT has been close working about mangroves in Pekalongan since before the pandemic, and we are happy to collaborate with new local partner who is more passionate and pro-active in promoting the importance of mangrove and its benefits to our future generation. By having international volunteers working together with local volunteers, not only it helps our local partner in promoting its causes to the international world but also has become one of few ways for our local GREAT volunteers' community to be active again.



Indonesia (GREAT)

A Both Star Paws Cat Ranger and Mulyo Asri Mangrove, on 1-6 September 2022: have attracted more of local volunteers to volunteer with us and give them a glimpse into IVS world with various topics, such as animal project and environment and showed them the difference that motivated them to do better in their daily life. Not only using our social media, in real life approach has been also the best way to engage with ex-participants (Indonesians) and potential future participants to keep volunteering with GREAT, with or without international volunteer.

Thailand (DaLaa)

DaLaa family work camp at VSC during 15-21 October 2022. As every years, we organize the DaLaa family work camp in October. But this years is specail as we also mix with the work camp form NVDA member so we welcome 2 volunteers form our neighborhood contry 1 from Give Myanmar and 1 from Lao. For the work we could almost finished our Clay house during this work camp as more than 20 people helping and joining, The mix of former, current volunteers and DaLaa people (members) staying and working together. We could also had session about many things such as culture/IVS etc.



Thailand (DaLaa)

Na nai kong project Date October to December. We start our new long term place at NaNaikong project. In this projects volunteers can learned many skills such as gardening, cooking, building, activities with kids.



Japan (NICE)

Kani workcamp in Oct. 15-22. 20% of school kids have foreign origin in Kani who have various difficulties (finances, isolations, family cares, etc.) to live in the exclusive society of Japan. Only 75% of them get the higher education (while over 95% of average Japanese). Many of them have no close friends with other Japanese. So, this workcamp vols. firstly visit and run the classes in their schools to build the trust and finally organized the 2 days of "Rainbow Camp" with those kids. The kids got very close to both vols. and other kids and some cried when they shared their life in the candle night. They got motivated to study more by getting friends of the same age in the similar situations and also Japanese univ. students! "I learned not to give up on my goals that I've set." "I learned quite a few Japanese words and now I have a little bit confident to speak about it." "It changed now I think about my future here in Japan." "The college student bother/sister was very good and they teach us very well." This project was presented and got the 2nd prize in the final, national IVS contest by NICE.



Japan (NICE)

Nyamanche Primary School (Kenya), Aug. 13-30. Yui joined this workcamp for the first time with the motivation to work on the issue of Female Genital Mutilation (FGM). Her image to Kenya/ Africa and also visions to the international cooperation have been completely changed through the real work and life together with the locals. Afterwards, she has decided to take one year off from her univ. and go for volunteering more deeply and widely toward working as the qualified professionals for development field in the future. She presented her experience and got the best prize in the final, national IVS contest by NICE.

India(FSL)

Through social leaders action circle, 17 Micro projects are completed and benefited the community between January till December



India (FSL)

The Cardiff University students has conducted digital Literacy program at Dharamshala work camp from 1 - 30th August and 2 computers are distributed to the Government school students for continuous education



India (SMILE)

We provide training and educate community women to buildup such Rooftop Organic Farm on their house top. Looks like it became very popular too.



India (SMILE)

Project name, dates: Yoga Workshop and Kids Story: This project became very attractive among volunteers. It is an amazing opportunity to learn more about Yoga and Meditation from experienced trainers while having a chance to work with the refugee kids.

One of the very young German volunteer who stayed with us for 6 months was highly influenced by volunteering opportunities which provided insight into local issues and problems and helped her in her personal development. She said "without this volunteering placement, she would not have seen this new world which

Bringing Forest Back from 22 August to 3 September 2022 A group of 5 Japanese and 2 Italian volunteers along with a few local women and the Forest Department planted more than 200 local species trees on two roadside locations leading to a village and an ancient temple. The community was very happy that young international volunteers did manual work for their community and the volunteers appreciated the love and affection extended to them through local hospitality.

Sustainable Livelihood & Food Production (SLFP), Jan 2022- Dec 2022 Within the framework of the sustainable food production among Dalits by managing local water resources for micro irrigation and kitchen garden development pilot project (Sustainable Livelihood & Food Production (SLFP) Project, 31 families (150 family members) of Taluwa and Thaluchhap community of Siddhicharan Municipality, Okhaldhunga got support to build water collection chambers close to their houses where they can store 4000 liters water from multiple sources. The families who have been involved in the program took part in a five days long kitchen garden training following permaculture techniques. The training was focused on soil quality improvement, seed germination, manure making, seasonal and off-seasonal nursery bed preparation, methods to prepare natural pesticides at home, drip irrigation system, water resource management, water collection, and techniques of optimum use of water, etc.

Volunteers are happy with their lives with local people while they gained a great experience in their work and daily schedule.


Hong Kong (Voltra)


Laos (HJA)

3-2. Training & Networking Workcamp

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NVDA usually organizes the Training & Networking Workcamp (TNW) together with the General Assembly (GA). It was stopped in 2020-2021 due to the restriction by the COVID-19, and finally, 16th TNW was hosted in Hat Yai, Thailand in Jun. 1-6 by DALAA while the 17th GA was organized in hybrid.

8 participants from 5 NGOs in 5 countries (Japan-NICE, Laos-HJA, Myanmar-GIVE, Thailand-DALAA and Vietnam-VPV). Beside the meeting time of the GA, they have enjoyed the voluntary work to make the clay bricks and save the fallen tree by wind, the exchange parties with the volunteers from Thailand and the world, project visit and local market.



3-3. Asian Volunteers Voice on SDGs and NGO Empowerment

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NVDA started organizing this online event from 2020 Dec. that is **open to the individual member of Member NGOs and public, focusing on SDGs and NGO projects working on each goal**. It is coordinated by the Executive Committee with active participation of the member NGOs.

It has been held 11 times (2 times in 2022) with 283 participants (Average: 26) from following 26 countries/ areas joined & 16 NGOs in 11 countries presented 27 projects!




< Greening Mongolia >

Before 1990, the forests are covered 10% of Mongolian land, but only 7% today. It's caused by cutting trees without any controls, forest fire and global warming. And it takes a hundred or more years to grow trees in Mongolia. Volunteers have been planting thousands of trees in the workcamps since 2002, as a part of Greening Asia campaign.



< Satoyama Conservation in Japan >

Tochigi Conservation Corps was founded in 2009 and works on forest preservation for biodiversity. Thus, TCC utilizes forests as a social place with social welfare, education, etc. In 2017, TCC got the first prize in the big award for inclusive societies in Japan. Volunteers do manual work such as weeding, cutting undesirable trees/ bamboos and also help outdoor activities with kids.



The feedbacks from the participants were very positive and it was really a nice time also for me not only because of the wonderful projects and discussions on SDGs 15, but also they are the ones who have actively developed NVDA and IVS movement in Asia with me since 2000 😊

Vol. 11 to promote IVS projects in 5 countries

It was held on Aug. 5th with 17 attendees and 5 organizers and guest speakers.



The meeting was colorful and dynamic with the sharing and inspiring of the formal volunteers and informative introduction of the hosting projects. We got attention and interest of future volunteers who would like to join projects in both Thailand and Australia, thus, there were a lots of questions raised by the attendees to have a better understanding on IVS as well as the projects.



We had amazing support from SVI Belgium to sponsor the ZOOM account to host the meeting and will keep continuing for the next AVV.



3-4. World Peace Action Night

(Solidarity projects with Myanmar and Ukraine)

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Though tons of news about the war in Ukraine are reported every day, how the animals are suffered is rarely known. Thousands of pets left behind. They were not allowed to get on the trains, so the family (owners) had to leave them in the station. Or the family was killed by the war.



And so many serious peace issues in the world are neglected, including Myanmar. Over 100,000 (one third of Population) have become IDPs (Internal Displaced People) from Kayah state who are struggled by the very hard life conditions mentally, physically and economically...



This online event was fruitfully organized on the Jul. 18th by NICE (Japan), GIVE (Myanmar) and Union Forum (Ukraine) with the support of NVDA and other IVS networks such as ALLIANCE and CCIVS. 27 participants from 10 countries actively joined including the leaders of NVDA members such as Alex (DALAA Thailand), Prakash (FFN Nepal) and Printer (GV4GF Sri Lanka).



Inga, Executive Director of Union Forum, shared her great initiatives to save the animals including to host 30 dogs in her house. The most of animals have been adopted through the partner NGOs in Europe, but there are still many who don't have places to go and Inga is faced on serious lack of the fund to transport the donated food and other live stocks, etc. from Poland.

"Why you save the animals, not human being? How can you answer if someone criticize you like this?" asked by Ben, who is also running a NGO in Indonesia saving cats and other animals. "We also support refugees. And animals are also important part of our families. They totally depend on human, so caring them is our responsibility. Nobody else help them who really need us", Inga said.

Thazin, Executive Director of GIVE and also General Secretary of NVDA, shared the plan to empower IDPs by buying the land and let them practice organic farming and create the farmers fair market that could improve their life quality,

income generation and skills development. To have a pilot project of 4,000 m2 land with 5 farmers, 5,000 USD of donations are needed.



"What if IDPs could come back their home? Who will maintain the land?" asked by Akiko, Uni. Professor in Japan. "Unfortunately, they may not to be able to go back in 1-2 years on which they need more stable and healthy life. Thus, their home land was destroyed and IDP camp is not far, so even if they could go back, they'd keep coming to our project farm" answered by Thazin.



I as the facilitator closed the event with introducing the call for [the donation](#) (←Click here for donation page!) at from where 10 persons have donated 74,200 JPY (550 USD) till now.

3-5. SCC (Global Voluntary Service to Stop Climate Change)

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To dramatically increase the impact for carbon reduction as well as strengthen volunteerism and management of NGOs, NVDA started the SCC project in 2016 mainly, with sponsorship of the UPS Foundation, NLAPO and Mitsubishi UFJ Foundation. Since 2020, the international voluntary exchange has been stopped for this project, but some projects have been revived in 2022 as follows;

◀ Eco Tree Action ▶ (Japan & Cambodia)

This CSR project started in 2021 by Citizen (watch company), CYA & NICE since 2020 to donate the money to plant a mangrove tree every time the customer refuse a paper box.

In 2021-22, it generated 10,774 USD and CYA planted 48,320 trees!



◀ Mulyo Asri Workcamp ▶ (Indonesia)

The village was severely flooded by The climate change, but the local young people has initiated to revive the area.

The bilateral workcamp by GREAT & NICE was organized for the first time in this village in 2022 Sep. 1-6.



◀ Trapaing Sangke ▶ (Cambodia)

The forest has been terribly lost by the port construction and illegal cut, so the community started reforestation and the eco tourism center.

CYA started the workcamps here since 2012 that was revived in 2022!



3-6. Asian Volunteering Night

- Starting IVS stories by 4+1 NGO founders

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In the night of Nov. 7th, a room in Tokyo was greatly heated by the passions and excitements from the special hybrid event, "Asian Volunteering Night - **Starting IVS stories by 4+1 NGO founders**".



Hi, I'm Baatar from Mongolia. I graduated from my univ. in 1998 where I was active in the student Unions. Then, I worked in the youth NGO named Mongolian Youth Federation for 3.5 years.

I found a news about a special workcamp in Vietnam and jumped into. In the end, I talked with Kai in the café about starting workcamps in Mongolia. I was a very poor English speaker, so he wrote the main points on the tissue paper, I brought it back to Mongolia and tried to understand...



I am Sophat from Cambodia. When I was 20, I came to the city and could not find what to do. I tried many things such as electric stuff, NGOs for disaster response, then made success in business, but still could be satisfied.

In 2010, I found a NVDA event to gather NGO leaders, so asked my office to have 2 weeks vacation to join it, but they said no, so I quit my job...



Childhood




< Some highlights of NVDA 2021 >

Exchange Platform Meeting (EPM)

The EPM 2022 happened partly online, on 27-28 September and 24 October, and in person in Braives, Belgium between 10 and 16 October hosted by SCI Belgium. The theme of the meeting was “Volunteering for youth as a tool for inclusion”. There was 45 participants from SCI branches & partners around the world.

The meeting was discussing on different topics includes: SCI Finance, Working on inclusion, Communication in SCI, Panel discussion on working with other networks, Decolonized volunteering, Project Management in SCI, SCI vision and strategies, and working group.

Various topics were dealt such as updates from each network, common campaigns on Climate Justice/ Raising Peace, Global LMTV Meetings, Issues in Ukraine, etc.

- 😊 Reactivate/ create new partnership for our projects was the main focus in 2022. (GREAT, Indonesia)
- 😊 Ex. members and local hosts greatly supported NICE by collecting the donations for its operation cost especially through the donations of "Monthly Supporters". (NICE, Japan)
- 😊 The new partnership with CESO Laos, a Canadian-based Volunteer Organization was a good start, that provides an international volunteer work closely with us to review its policy and strategy (HJA, Laos)
- 😊 With Heritage authority and academic professionals, aimed at providing our participants to learn basic knowledge about World Heritage and the stories behind, and how did the local authorities and community do to preserve it. We cooperated with Association of Macao Chi San Na-Tcha Temple, promote the local intangible cultural heritage project - WHV project – Feast of Na-Tcha, celebrate Na-Tcha 's birthday and the annual " Feast of Na-Tcha Parade", and pray for the prosperity of the country and the people. Affected by the epidemic, many tourists were unable to participate in the scene in person. Volunteers produced online information and spread them through the Internet. (MNCYA, Macau)





- ☺ The financial balance was +4,370 USD though Membership fee was exempted to all members.



Balance per one NGO




The total situation in 2022 was greatly improved from 2021 though it was still in difficulties.
